Followup Regarding Problem Properties Cited by Council Member Shimulunas at the May 15 Council Meeting

**Property #1:** Location on 11<sup>th</sup> Street. This property owner had been contacted by the Community Service Officer on May 9 about materials on the terrace and in the front yard; was given until May 22 to comply. Property was not in compliance upon re-inspection and owner was issued a citation on May 24.

**Property #2:** Location on Roosevelt Avenue. This property is the subject of a current enforcement action under the City's Chronic Nuisance Ordinance. City is awaiting Circuit Court authorization to go onto the property for removal of materials that constitute violations of City ordinances. Property was previously the subject of an enforcement action under the Chronic Nuisance Ordinance, for which the Municipal Court assessed penalty and costs totaling \$500.

## Penalty Provisions of Ordinance Sec. 9-3-4 Destruction of noxious weeds and regulation of height of lawns and weeds.

E. All lawns shall be kept cut to a height not to exceed eight inches. Noxious weeds and nuisance weeds as described in this section shall be destroyed as provided in subsection A. of this section. If the owner of any property fails to maintain its lawn at a height not to exceed eight inches, within five days of the mailing of written notice from the city demanding the same, addressed to the owner at his last-known address, the city may cause the lawn to be cut, and the cost thereof shall be charged to the property as a special charge pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 66.0627.

F. If the person owning, occupying or controlling land fails to comply with the notice referred to in subsections B. or E. of this section within five days of its mailing, such owner shall be subject to a forfeiture of \$75.00. In the event of any additional violations of the same subsection of this section in the same calendar year, involving the same property and the same owner, such owner will be subject to a forfeiture of \$150.00 for each subsequent violation, in addition to being required to destroy weeds or cut the grass and remove clippings in a timely manner or be subject to a charge by the city for performing such abatement work, as provided in subsections B. and E. above.

Penalty Provisions of Ordinance Sec. 9-7 Chronic Nuisance Premises

### Sec. 9-7-9. - Violations and penalties.

- A. Any person who violates any provision of this chapter will be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$200.00 nor more than \$5,000.00, plus court costs. Additional costs incurred by the city for enforcement or abatement of nuisances related to this chapter in full or part shall be assessed. Such costs shall be billed to the premises owner by invoice sent by regular mail and must be paid within 30 days of the date on the invoice. Any unpaid invoice shall result in a \$100.00 administrative fee and a lien on such premises that may be assessed and collected as a special charge pursuant to Wis. Stats. § 66.0627.
- B. Each subsequent incident of enforcement action for nuisance activity after a premises has been deemed to be a chronic nuisance premises shall constitute a separate offense and penalties will continue to be assessed until the nuisance is abated.

Various City ordinances and practices pertaining to property maintenance and nuisance properties will be discussed at the Council work session on June 26
