With all funds taken into account, Two Rivers City Government is a \$43 million annual operation



The City Budget is comprised of Individual budget for various funds. Major fund types include:

- --Tax-Supported Funds
- -- Utility Funds
- --Special Revenue Funds
- -- Capital Projects Funds



#### Tax-supported funds include the:

#### --General Fund,

Operating budgets that include Police, Fire, Public Works, Parks & Rec and General Gov't

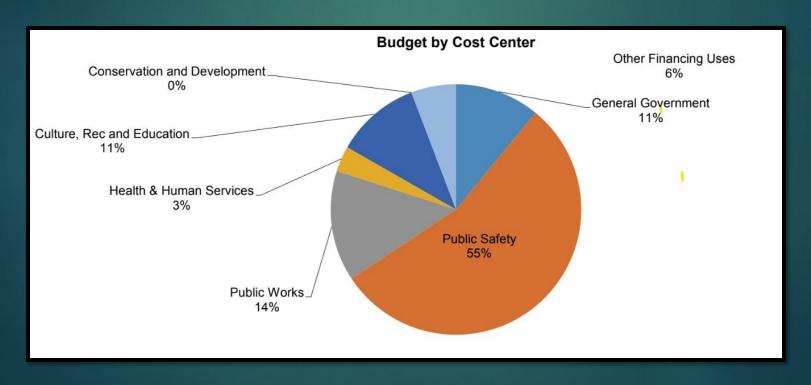
- > \$11,142,949 (net of budgeted contingency) proposed for 2023, an increase of 2.9% over 2022
- Funded \$2.25 mm from property taxes (\$19,500 increase proposed)
- --Library Operating Budget
- \$892,817 in 2023, funded \$631,287 from property taxes (unchanged form 2022; no property tax increase proposed)
- -- Debt Service Budget
- \$2,802,820 in 2023, funded \$2,518,625 from property taxes (\$137,837 increase proposed, to cover debt service on capital projects from prior years)

## City of Two Rivers 2023 Budget Overview Tax-Supported Funds General Fund

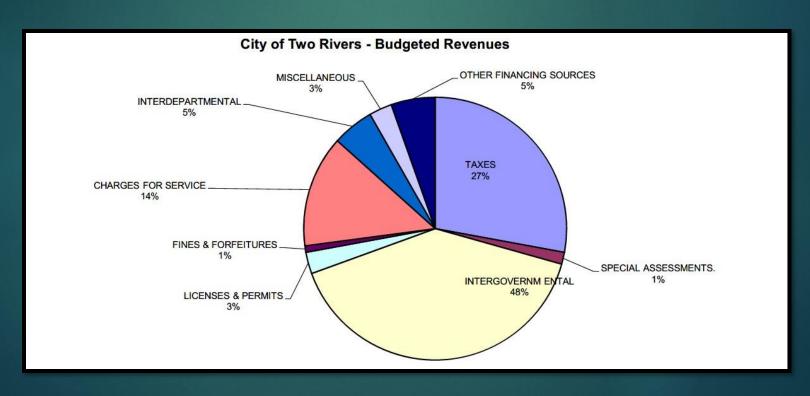
- --\$11,142,949 proposed spending (net of \$300,000 contingency)
- --Up 2.9% over 2022
- --Tax levy for General Fund proposed to increase by \$19,500 over 2022
- --Largest increases in revenues are from Water Utility Property Tax Equivalent payment, misc. transfers fees and charges
- --Over 85% of General Fund Budget is Personnel Costs
- -- Proposed spending covers:
  - --Maintaining current FT staffing levels
  - -- Upgrading an Engineering Tech position from PT to FT
  - --Pay raises for Police and Fire, per contracts (2% Jan., 2% July 1)
  - --3% pay raise for non-union employees
  - --Health insurance premium increase of 7.2%

#### City of Two Rivers 2023 Budget Overview Tax-Supported Funds Library Fund

Library Budget is adopted by the Library Board; City Council's role is to determine the amount of City tax levy support.

--Budget proposes maintaining current level of property tax support for the Library: \$631,287



## City of Two Rivers 2023 Budget Overview Tax-Supported Funds Debt Service Fund

The Debt Service Fund provides funding for principal & interest payments on general obligation debt issued in past years for capital projects

--Budget proposes a tax increase of \$137,837 to cover an increase in debt service in 2023 (P&I payments on debt issued in prior years)



## City of Two Rivers 2023 Budget Overview Tax-Supported Funds City Tax Rate

Tax levy increases proposed for General Fund and Debt Service would together result in an increase in the City portion of the property tax bill amounting to 2.79%, from \$10.9150 to \$11.2200 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

This would increase the City share of the tax bill on a \$100,000 assessed property from \$1,091.50 to \$1,122.00, or \$31.50.

History of recent changes in City tax rate is shown below:

<u>2020</u> -0.89% <u>2021</u> -0.17% <u>2022</u> 1.79% <u>2023</u> 2.79%



<u>UTILITY FUNDS: Budgets Totaling \$16.7 million</u>

Supported by User Charges; No Tax Support NO RATE CHANGES PROPOSED FOR 2023

1. Electric\* Operating expenses \$9,822,780, up 8.18%;

budgeted purchased power costs account for

most of that increase; balance of budget up 0.31%

2. Water\* Operating expenses \$2,813,625, up 4.29%;

mostly due to returning Property Tax Equivalent to

a normal level and increased depreciation

3. Wastewater

\$2,770,966, up 10.18%; of that amount, 6.3% due to an incr. in depreciation; 2% due to increased allowance for collection system repairs. Balance of increase due to chemicals, utilities and personnel costs

4. Storm Water

\$404,042, up 9.86% due to more planned system improvements

5. Solid Waste

\$854,059 up 4.6% due to personnel costs, increased refuse volumes, more street sweeping

6. Telecom

\$15,885, unchanged from 2022

Completing Purchase of Hamilton Property for Redevelopment (\$1.5 mm)
 --capital funds carried over from prior years budgets







Major Capital Projects and Purchases Budgeted for 2023 Total \$5.8 million and Include:

A major new playground at Neshotah Park (\$400,000)



Major Capital Projects and Purchases Budgeted for 2023 Total \$5.8 million and Include:

- Street Work including --Reconstruction of Lincoln St. from 17th to 22<sup>nd</sup> (\$2.6 mm)
- Resurfacing of Zlatnik Drive, 17th to Pierce (\$188,000)





Major Capital Projects and Purchases Budgeted for 2023 Total \$5.8 million and Include:

- Replacing a DPW dump/plow truck (\$300,000)
- Replacing one Police patrol unit (\$50,000)
- \$116,000 for other Police equipment
- \$111,000 for Fire vehicles and equipment
- \$50,000 for replacement digital signs downtown
